

**COLLABORATIVE TEACHER EDUCATION PROGRAM
OF
SHEPHERD UNIVERSITY
AND
BLUE RIDGE COMMUNITY & TECHNICAL COLLEGE**

This agreement, entered into June 30, 2014 between Shepherd University [P.O. Box 5000, Shepherdstown, WV 25443] and Blue Ridge Community & Technical College [13650 Apple Harvest Drive, Martinsburg, WV 25403], amended with additional concentrations, course changes, and streamlined procedures reflected February 2017.

Shepherd University (SU) and Blue Ridge Community & Technical College (BRCTC) hereby establish this articulation agreement for the purpose of facilitating the academic progression of eligible students, at the baccalaureate level, following attainment of the associate's degree in order to complete a teacher certification program.

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this collaborative program is to establish and maintain a partnership between SU and BRCTC in order to create a seamless pathway to teacher certification for students beginning their academic career at BRCTC. Through this collaborative program, SU and BRCTC strive to

- Enroll students in a collaborative program that leads to professional teaching careers in the region,
- Provide students with a career-specific degree program that encompasses general education as well as professional education courses, and
- Prepare BRCTC graduates to be directly admitted through the collaborative program to the upper-division teacher education program at SU.

The program is a collaborative arrangement between BRCTC and SU, who have partnered to market the associate's degree in cooperation with the bachelor's degree as part of an overarching, career-entry program. Faculty at each institution will work closely throughout the program of study by coordinating placement efforts, participating in departmental meetings and information sessions, and participating in a faculty exchange to foster a climate of collaboration and shared intention.

II. BENEFITS

Eligible students entering the collaborative program are entitled to the following benefits of this agreement and partnership:

- Opportunities to secure teaching certification in secondary or elementary settings through articulation of teaching specializations including:
 - Social Studies (5-Adult)
 - General Science (5-Adult)
 - Biology (9-Adult)
 - Mathematics (5-Adult)
 - English (5-Adult)
 - Elementary (K-6)
 - Physical Education (K-Adult) established February 2017
 - Early Childhood (Pre K-K) established February 2017
- A carefully designed program sequence that supports completion of an Associate of Science in Education degree, partially fulfilling requirements of a corresponding teacher certification program
- Introduction to SU faculty through faculty exchanges on both campuses
- Parallel content in introductory professional education courses, which are articulated to promote completion of the certification program in four years
- Early experiences in the field to promote knowledge, skills, and dispositions required for professional education courses
- Access to library services at SU, including borrowing services at the Scarborough Library
- A planned and supported transition to the four-year campus through cooperative advising
- Acceptance of courses by SU which were completed at BRCTC and are listed in Exhibit A, which shall be fully applied towards the completion of the requirements of the bachelor's degree (see also section V, item 4)
- Direct admission to the SU teacher education program by meeting all requirements of Juncture 1 prior to matriculation to SU

III. ELIGIBILITY

An eligible student under this agreement shall be any person meeting all of the following standards:

- Has made application to SU using the designated BRCTC-SU Education application.
- Has completed the SU Juncture 1 requirements and been granted provisional status in the SU education program by the PEUC while enrolled in the BRCTC Associate of Science in Education program.
- Has subsequently been conferred the Associate of Science in Education degree by BRCTC.
- Has been determined by SU to meet all transfer student admissions requirements, has been determined by SU to meet all teacher education program requirements for full

status, and has been admitted to SU, all within not more than 12 months of completion of the Associate of Science in Education degree program

- Has, upon admission to SU, self-declared as a degree-seeking student majoring in Early Education, Elementary Education or a Secondary Education specialization outlined in the Exhibits.

IV. INSTITUTIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES

The Director of Teacher Education at SU and the Education Program Coordinator at BRCTC will collaborate and evaluate the program at least annually or as needed in order to assess its effectiveness, structure, and the students' progression toward the degree, as well as to cooperate on the implementation of changes mandated by the West Virginia Department of Education and/or the professional accrediting body of the teacher education program. Any issues identified through evaluation will be brought to the SU Professional Education Unit Council (PEUC) for consideration.

Additional administrative responsibilities of SU and BRCTC include:

- BRCTC will provide a regular update of information for students who are enrolled in the BRCTC education program who have maintained satisfactory academic progress. SU agrees to share graduation data with BRCTC.
- BRCTC shall confer with SU on the production and maintenance of specialization handbooks, to which students will be required to adhere during their program of study at both institutions.
- The Education Program Coordinator at BRCTC will advise all teacher education candidates in collaboration with specialization coordinators at SU.
- BRCTC shall include in all specialization and professional education courses required key assessments, and shall submit corresponding documentation to a designee of SU for attachment to the TK20 assessment database.
- BRCTC will confer with the placement coordinator at SU on all field experience requirements, the practicum profile, and field placements of BRCTC students.
- The Education Program Coordinator or designee of BRCTC will serve as a member of the SU Education Personnel Preparation Advisory Council (EPPAC) and the PEUC with voting privileges, except regarding issues of SU students' records and status.
- BRCTC, where permitted, shall advertise and market the program to all prospective and existing students by reasonable means, including catalogs, program guides, brochures, and the institutional website. SU shall promote the program to its applicants who express an interest in the baccalaureate degree but do not meet the admissions requirements of SU.

The chief academic officers or designees of SU and BRCTC will each provide notice to one

another of any changes in curriculum of the program prior to implementation of the changes. SU will honor and make ongoing best efforts to update and publish the Transfer Equivalency System course equivalencies maintained by the SU Registrar.

V. LIMITATIONS

The benefits provided to eligible students under this agreement are subject to the following limitations:


1. Eligible teacher education candidates must remain free of misdemeanor and felony criminal charges and offenses.
2. Eligible teacher education candidates must not have made prior application to a teacher education program and been denied, or have been previously accepted in a teacher education program and been removed.
3. Upon admission to the SU teacher education program at Juncture 1, the student must be retained at full status in the Teacher Education Program in order to be eligible for courses in the professional sequence of the program.
4. If an eligible student under this agreement enrolls at SU then changes his or her major to any other SU degree program, credit for BRCTC courses will only be applicable to the SU courses designated in the Exhibits, even if the designated SU course is not required for the alternative degree program of the student.
5. If the course transfer provisions reflected in the Exhibits or any other provision of the agreement are amended due only to changes initiated by SU, the earlier course transfer provisions shall remain applicable to any eligible student as defined above provided that such a student maintains continuous enrollment at SU for so long as that student remains under his or her original catalog degree requirements.
6. If the course transfer provisions reflected in the Exhibits are amended due only to changes initiated by SU, the earlier course transfer provisions shall remain applicable to any eligible student as defined above within not more than 24 months following the implementation of amendments to this agreement.
7. If changes in the SU curriculum make complete adherence to the provisions of the Exhibits impossible, SU shall make such academically-viable accommodations as necessary to eligible students affected by the curriculum change, to provide equivalent benefit to them from this collaborative program.
8. If changes to the program content or admissions requirements are mandated by either the West Virginia Department of Education or the professional accrediting body, changes must be made effective immediately and BRCTC and SU shall make such academically-viable accommodations as necessary to eligible students affected by the curriculum change, to provide equivalent benefit to them from this collaborative program.

9. Exhibit A organized in a semester-by-semester format for the purpose of offering a recommended progression to students who enter the program at BRCTC. The actual sequence in which courses are completed at BRCTC does not affect the students' eligibility for the collaborative program; however, failure to follow the recommended progression for courses at either BRCTC or SU may and often will impede the students' ability to complete the baccalaureate degree in only two additional years.
10. Exhibit B is the organized semester-by-semester progression for the additional concentrations added in October 2016 to be effective Spring 2017. The actual sequence in which courses are completed at BRCTC does not affect the students' eligibility for the collaborative program; however, failure to follow the recommended progression for courses at either BRCTC or SU may and often will impede the students' ability to complete the baccalaureate degree in only two additional years.

VI. AUTHORIZATIONS


Amendments to this agreement shall be in writing. Either party may terminate this agreement by six months' notice in writing, but such cancellation shall have no effect on currently eligible students.
