

THE LAB NEXT DOOR

Pantene shampoo, first manufactured in 1945, was named for one of its key ingredients – panthenol. Panthenol is a provitamin of B5. It serves as a moisturizing agent and improves wound healing in pharmaceutical and cosmetic products. With Procter & Gamble's (P&G) acquisition of Pantene in 1985, Pantene distribution expanded on a massive scale, making the hair care technology of Pantene accessible to women everywhere. Procter& Gamble is locating a manufacturing center in the Martinsburg area. Pantene is one of



many products P&G will produce at the facility. Quality control testing will be a key factor in the manufacturing of Pantene. Quality Control is a process that ensures quality in manufactured products through a series of tests- such as pH, percentage of solids, foam formation, foam quality, viscosity, and dirt dispersion. Does this type of work sound like something that may interest you? Check out the Applied Laboratory Technician certificate program here at Blue Ridge Community and Technical College. This program trains its students to work in quality control within a

manufacturing setting.

IS THIS THE RIGHT JOB FOR YOU?

Here are some simple rules of thumb to help you decide whether a job offer is right for you.

Do some soul searching. At Bentley, our students actually begin the "soul searching" process during freshman year; but it's still an ongoing, lifelong process. Identify your interests, passions, and personality. What's going to keep you inspired and getting out of bed each day for work? Differentiate between logistical aspects of a job offer—salary, health benefits—and other opportunities like culture, mentors, educational reimbursement and professional memberships. (Try to get away from expectations placed on you by family and friends.)

Review the offer with career services. Once you get a verbal or written offer, make an appointment with a career <u>services</u> professional at your school. They can review compensation and benefits,

address any concerns, and discus appropriate next steps. (They can also guide you on offer etiquette—whether accepting or declining an offer—as most schools have policies on both.)

Set (or re-set) your priorities. Just because an employer did not pop open a bottle of expensive champagne during your job offer, it doesn't mean that they don't value your work. Companies have different policies they need to follow. Step back and think about the big picture: Is the company culture a good fit? Do they offer great benefits? Is there opportunity to grow?

SECURITY NOTES: STALKING

As January is National Stalking Awareness Month, the Blue Ridge CTC Security Department urges students, as well as members of the college staff and faculty, to remain vigilant and cognizant of their immediate surroundings, and to be especially on guard if they are now, or have previously been involved in a domestic violence, or harmful relationship. Security asks anyone who has received indications, or has sensed that they have become the fixation of a stalker, to contact the Security Office at Extension 2250. The Security Department is ready to provide escorts to and from our campus locations to vehicles, and to serve as liaison with local law enforcement and the county prosecutor's office. In addition, stalking is designated a Clery Act crime and in many situations, falls under the purview of the Title IX Coordinator, Ann Paull. Ann may be reached at Extension 2126.

The average duration of stalking is 1.8 years. -John Carrol University, Violence and Prevention Action Center

Below are some statistics and facts from the International Association of Chiefs of Police to help paint clearer picture of how potent a problem stalking is in the United States:


- All 50 U.S. states now have anti-stalking laws
- The majority of stalking efforts are not reported to the police
- Stalking crimes that are reported reflect that 61% of female and 44% of male victims report being stalked by a current or former intimate partner
- Most stalkers are known to their victims (1 in 8 females report being stalked by strangers and 1 in 5 males stalked by strangers)
- The majority of stalking victims fall within the age group: 18 to 24
- Common stalking behaviors include: following; constant telephone calling; monitoring victim's computer usage
- Ignoring a stalker does not cause them to give up; they will tend to escalate and statistics reflect that their behavior tends to become violent in nature
- Even the less technologically savvy stalker will use GPS, cell Phones, covert cameras, email, social media and monitoring of popular sites to track victims

The Blue Ridge CTC Security Department is prepared to deal with stalking situations, so please do not hesitate to seek out one of our officers should you believe you are the object of a stalker's obsession. If you are contacted by any person you perceive as a threat to your overall safety, do not hesitate to call 911 via your cell phone. If approached in the Blue Ridge CTC Headquarters parking lot, each of the four Blue Emergency poles contain telephones that will connect directly to the Berkeley County Emergency Dispatcher. Our Security unit maintains 24/7 surveillance over the interior and exterior public spaces at Headquarters and the Tech Center campuses, and vigorously strives to keep Blue Ridge CTC students and staff safe and secure.
