

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# RECIPE OF THE MONTH: HAM BONE, WHITE BEANS & COLLARD GREENS



#### **Ingredients**

One Smoked ham hock

Chicken broth: 3 quarts

Collard greens: 1 1/4 lb

Vegetable oil: 1 Tbsp

Salt pork, minced: ¼ cup

White beans (canned): 28oz

Onion, minced: 1 1/4 cup

Celery, minced: 1/2 cup

Flour, all-purpose:1/2 cup

Heavy cream:1/2 cup

Malt vinegar: 2 tsp

Tabasco sauce, salt and pepper: To taste

**Sachet:** 6 whole black peppercorns,4 parsley stems and 1 sprig fresh thyme wrapped in cheesecloth and tied with butchers twin.



Yield: 8-10 servings

#### **Directions**

Place the ham hock and broth in a pot large enough to accommodate both. Bring to a simmer and cook, partially covered, for 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  hours. Remove the ham hock from the broth and allow both to cool slightly.

Meanwhile, bring a large pot of salted water to a boil. Cut the tough ribs and stems away from the collard greens. Plunge the greens into the boiling water and cook for 10 minutes. Drain and cool slightly. Chop the greens coarsely and set aside.

Heat the oil in a soup pot over medium heat. Add the salt pork and cook until crisp, 3-5 minutes. Add the onion and celery; cook, stirring occasionally, until tender, about 5 minutes.

Add the flour and cook, stirring frequently, for 5 minutes. Gradually add the broth, whisking constantly to work out any lumps of flour. Bring to a simmer and add the collard greens, beans, ham hock and sachet. Cook for 1 hour. Remove and discard the sachet. Remove the ham hock and cool slightly. Trim away the skin and fat and dice the lean meat. Add the meat back to the soup. Add the cream and season to taste with vinegar, Tabasco, salt and pepper.

## APPLIED UAS TECHNOLOGIES PROGRAM



#### **All About Drones**



Blue Ridge Community and Technical College is the first community college in West Virginia, and among the first in the Country, to offer coursework focused on teaching how to use drones professionally.

The Certificate and A.A.S. in Applied UAS Technologies at Blue Ridge CTC prepare students for careers as drone operators, data analysts, cartographers, or remote sensing technicians and many will have the opportunity for work both indoors and out. Applied UAS Technologies students are prepared to not only operate unmanned aircraft, but to collect, process, and analyze aerial data to produce uniquely valuable deliverables. Here are some examples of drone use in industry:

Public Safety – Thermographic sensors compare the relative heat of a given object to its surroundings. In this way, missing people can be located quickly and efficiently from a distance. Utility service providers use drone thermography to identify issues along power transmission lines before they interrupt service.

Agriculture: Specialized sensors determine the health of crops in a field by measuring the amount of reflected light. In general, a plant containing more chlorophyll is healthier than a plant containing less. Since chlorophyll strongly absorbs visible light, the amount of reflected light measured by the sensor can be used to predict plant health. This information is useful in precision agriculture, such as determining where fertilizer or herbicide should be applied.

Environmental: The UAS 102 class at Blue Ridge is collaborating with Sustainable Solutions, LLC (Shepherdstown, WV) to map the health of riparian buffers lining several hundred acres of pasture. Utilizing drones reduces the time required to complete site evaluation (from months to days) and produces geospatially accurate maps which are also useful for land management and planning.

Surveying and Mapping: Determination of the exact location of something on earth is valuable information. Geographic Information System (GIS) software enables data to be stored, analyzed, processed, and presented in ways that illuminate specific trends of interest. Aerially captured data, processed and analyzed with GIS software, produces valuable client deliverables.

Construction – Photogrammetry is measurement with photographic analyses. Photogrammetry is highly useful in construction earthwork calculations. Photos of an excavated area (cut), can be used to estimate the amount of material removed. Areas of excess material (fill) are calculated in a similar manner. These measurements can be used to track project progress, specification compliance, and payment. Time-lapse photos, taken at the same locations throughout the course of a project provide useful data to project managers and are excellent resources in resolving issues.

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
## APPLIED LABORATORY TECHNICIAN PROGRAM



## The Applied Laboratory Technician program is unique to this area.

The program trains students to set up and maintain instrumentation used in many of the local manufacturing facilities. Students learn to verify the quality of different products and substances; students have an opportunity to complete internships in the local community, and local businesses recruit students from the program.

The Environmental Science Technician program kicked off its first classes this fall. Students learn sustainable practices that protect the area's environmental resources. This semester, a local employer spoke to the students about internships that are currently available.



Students learn about environmental, safety, and health regulations, monitoring requirements, and management practices to protect the environment and workers' health in government and manufacturing facilities.

Potential job settings vary from office settings to field work. There's an environmental job setting to fit almost anyone's personality and preferences.
