


Textbooks for the current term (including new, used, customized course materials and course packs) may be refunded in the original form of payment during the first week of class, with an original receipt. After the first week of class, and up to thirty (30) days after the start of classes, a full refund will be given if the student provides proof of schedule change with an original receipt.

Medical and General Reference books adopted for the current term may be refunded in the original form of payment during the first week of class, with an original receipt. Any medical or general reference textbook not part of the current term will follow the 14-day return policy.

No refunds on unwrapped loose leaf books or activated eBooks.

The **2018-2019 FAFSA** is now available. You should complete this online application if you plan to attend school during any of the following semesters: Fall 2018, Spring 2019, Summer 2019.

When you complete the FAFSA, which needs to be completed **every year**, you will be asked for your 2016 tax information. The best method to input this information is to use the FAFSA's Data Retrieval Tool to link your tax information directly from the IRS website into your FAFSA. This will ensure the proper information is used, and it will help reduce your chances of being selected to turn in extra documentation.

SKILLS 101 **Math** Boot Camp helps students prepare for the ACCUPLACER exam and is now available on Blackboard (once orientation is completed). Lessons require approximately 1 week, or 15 hours, to complete. You must set up appointments for a minimum of two live sessions with Kathy Collis, which include an orientation session and a final Q & A session, before scheduling the math placement test. The orientation session includes time for individualized help with computer and video access. The final Q & A session will be set up after completing a math problem packet. ## Lunch and Learn

On November 7th, The Student Veterans Association sponsored a Lunch and Learn workshop called "Military Experiences: A View from the Inside." Three speakers—BRCTC students Sam Rock and Shannon Carson, and former student, Nancy Mahaffey—discussed the ways the military has impacted their lives from their own unique and varied perspectives.

Sam Rock, a veteran of the Army himself, talked about his experiences while in the military, as well as the issues he still faces as he re-acclimates to civilian life. Shannon Carson, a military spouse, related how her family was affected while her spouse was deployed, as well as the issues they faced after he returned home. Nancy Mahaffey, who was born in Addis Ababa, the capital city of Ethiopia, told us the story of how she came to be rescued by the U.S. military and why she eventually made America her home.

Many of the attendees were moved to tears by the speakers' rich and vivid stories of devotion and dedication; all expressed appreciation for the wealth of perspectives the speakers provided.

This event was organized by Britney Norris, Veterans' Education Coordinator.

## Blue Ridge CTC Student Attends State-Wide Business Plan Competition

The 12<sup>th</sup> Annual Collegiate Student Business Plan Competition, hosted by the College of Business & Economics at West Virginia University, received 292 submissions from students throughout West Virginia. Students submitted plans within three categories, including Lifestyle and Innovation, Hospitality and Tourism, and STEM. Students are competing for a grand prize of \$10,000, to receive free legal and accounting advice, and for the opportunity to start a new business in the state. The competition is open to any full-time student at a West Virginia college or university in any major.

This year, four Blue Ridge CTC students participated in the competition, and one moved to the semi-final round: Business Administration major **Eileen Kusnirak**. Her plan, The Gaming Zone, LLC, was reviewed by judges, as well as by her peers. The Gaming Zone, LLC, will create a one-stop shop for game enthusiasts of all ages. Kusnirak then attended the semi-final event, hosted by West Virginia Wesleyan College in Buckhannon, West Virginia. The event consisted of one-on-one interviews and elevator pitches. On December 5<sup>th</sup>, five out of the ten student winners will be notified that they have been selected to participate in the final round.

For the first time in the history of the Business Plan Competition, Blue Ridge CTC students participated. Faculty advisor Todd Cimino-Johnson stated, "This business plan competition is a way for the students of Blue Ridge to show what the Eastern Panhandle brings to the table. We had four great ideas this year. I hope next year we can submit many more entries and start seeing these businesses open up and become successful."

The final competition will take place on April 20<sup>th</sup>, 2018, in Morgantown, West Virginia. The winners for each category will be announced at that time. Previous winners and non-winners have moved on to open successful businesses throughout the state.

## **Thinking of transferring to another institution after Blue Ridge CTC? Then the following is a must-read:**

In an ongoing effort to create pathways to student success, Blue Ridge CTC seeks out articulation agreements (think “partnerships”) with four-year institutions. An articulation agreement governs the transfer of a student’s earned credits between two institutions and degree programs. The list below lists the partnerships Blue Ridge CTC has recently formed and the programs to which they pertain.

### Recently-Established Articulation Agreements:

- Frostburg State University – Business Administration, A.S. to Business Administration, B.S., General Management
- Grand Canyon University – Any associate’s degree program to corresponding bachelor’s degree program, with transfer credits review
- Ohio Valley University – General Studies, A.S. to Forensic Investigative Accounting, B.S.
- Rennes School of Business, France – Business Administration, A.S. to International Bachelor Program in Management
- Shenandoah University – Business Administration, A.S. to Business Administration, B.S.
- Shepherd University – Update of Criminal Justice, A.A.S. to Sociology, B.S.--now General Studies, A.S., with Sociology concentration to Sociology, B.S., with Criminal Justice concentration
- Southern New Hampshire University – Overall articulation agreement with appendices in nursing, criminal justice, and business

administration

- West Virginia University – Business Administration, A.S. to Business Administration, B.S. (2+2 model and a 2+2 ½ model)
- West Virginia University – Business Administration, A.S. to Agribusiness Management, B.S.
